

# **Pregnancy Induced Hypertension**

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## Introduction

Hypertension: is the most common medical problem encountered during pregnancy, complicating up to 10% of pregnancies.

<sup>[1]</sup> Hypertensive disorders during pregnancy are classified into 4 categories, as recommended by the National High Blood Pressure : Chronic hypertension

Preeclampsia-eclampsia

Preeclampsia superimposed on chronic hypertension Gestational hypertension (transient hypertension of pregnancy or chronic hypertension identified in the latter half of pregnancy). [2] This terminology is preferred over the older but widely used term

"pregnancy-induced hypertension" (PIH)

# **Classifications**



#### Risk Factors

- 1. Multiple pregnancies. Women who have undergone multiple pregnancies aremore compromised with hypertension.
- 2.Primiparas who are 20 years and older. This group has an increased risk for pregnancy induced hypertension than women who are 40 years old and above.
- 3.Underlying disease. This disease might contribute to the occurrence of pregnancy  $^{[1]}$  induced hypertension.

## **Definitions**

Pregnancy induced hypertension (PIH) is a condition wherein vasospasm occurs during pregnancy in both the small and <sup>[1]</sup> large arteries in the body.

[2] Also known as gestational hypertension.

It occurs in about 5 percent to 8 percent of all pregnancies.

. With high blood pressure, there is an increase in the resistance of blood vessels. This may hinder blood flow in many different organ systems in the expectant mother Including<sup>1</sup> the liver, kidneys, brain, uterus, and placenta.

Gestional hypertension, also referred to as pregnancy hypertension is a condition characterized by high blood pressure during pregnancy.

High blood pressure can present itself in a few different ways during pregnancy, yhe following are 3 common types of gestational hypertension:

- 1.Chronic hypertension.

- 3. Sever preeaclampsisa.
